A Rewarding Life, Lesson 4, April 19, 2020

- We are going to be focusing that day of judgment and I'm going to be painting you a picture of what that day will be like.
- <u>How disappointed would you be</u> to come to the end of your life and realize that you had not lived it right or according to what Jesus wanted?
- <u>This is a legitimate concern</u>; we find even such a committed individual as the Apostle Paul concerned for himself on this issue: <u>I Cor. 9:26-27</u>
- <u>Before we take a critical</u> look at how we are currently running the race we need to look ahead and get view of the awards ceremony at the end of the race: **Begin with the end in view.**

1. What will it be like?

- <u>"That Day"</u> as it is called in Scripture will be, according to the Bible, much like the awards ceremony at the end of a race in the ancient Greek culture.
- First of all, the ancient awards ceremony had a judge
 - <u>Likewise</u>, our rewards ceremony will have a **Judge**---who will it be? <u>Jn. 5:22</u>
- Secondly, the Greek awards ceremony had a seat called the bema it was where the judge sat.
- Rom. 14:10, 12
- A Third thing we need to see is that just as the individual runner would stand before the bema at the end of a race, so will we stand individually and give a report for all the things we've done in this life. II Cor. 5:10

2. Paul speaks of that event, the most thoroughly in I Cor. 3:10-15, here he likens the work we have done in this life to a building.

- V. 10-11
- <u>V. 12-13</u> -- <u>First purpose of the bema is to **show**</u> → key words: "become clear, declare, revealed"
- V. 13b-15 -- Second purpose is to test
- Another thing: you aren't being tested, neither is your destination, only your works.
- Your works will endure like gold, silver, and precious stones
- Or <u>Your works will be burned</u> up like straw and none will remain <u>no matter how sensible</u>, <u>enjoyable</u>, <u>or religious</u> those works may have seemed to you while you were alive.

3. <u>Let's take a moment to really get a grasp of what that day will be like by comparing two believers' experiences on that day.</u>

- One is a high ranking church official (pastor, someone over many churches or a large ministry)
- Second is a blue collar worker with a high school education.
- All their works are piled up and put the fire test --- Which one will receive the most reward?
- The answer: there is no way to completely know before that day! I Cor. 4:5
- Only after the fire test will we really know how a person's life has added up for eternity.

4. So what will cause a work, our work to either endure or be burned at the bema seat?

- <u>First of all, we must understand</u> that Jesus will not only judge <u>what we do</u>, but also <u>how</u> and <u>why</u> we did it.
- Don't be fooled into thinking that if we fix the "what" part of what we do we're O.K.

5. There are 3 tests that for our purposes we'll call the "Gold Standard" that will help us evaluate whether the work we do for God will endure.

- 1. The Test of Relationship --- Jn. 15:5, I Jn. 2:28 The Christian life is not so much what you do as it is whose you are.
 - Bottom line for the reason Jesus saved you is so that you could be HIS.
- 2. <u>The Test of Motives</u> --- <u>Mt. 6:1</u> Notice, even "religious" activity is worthless if our motive is to build up our egos or reputations.
- 3. The Test of Love --- Lk. 6:35, I Cor. 13:3 True good works are focused on improving the wellbeing of another.

These Tests reveal that we simply cannot judge others lives, but we can and should evaluate our own.
