## Acts of Jesus, Lesson 33: Open Doors

- So, Paul, Silas, Luke, and Timothy get this call to come and minister in Macedonia, but then they get there, and things are anything but smooth.
  - Watch what happens in Thessalonica: Acts 17:1-10
  - Does that look like an open door of opportunity to you? But it was!
  - <u>We often think that a tell-tale sign that a door of</u> opportunity is open for us is for there to be no opposition, but often opposition is one of the signs that the door is open!
- 1. <u>How do we know when God is opening a door of opportunity for us; what does a</u> real God given opportunity look like?

First of all, we need to address the fact that not all open doors are from God.

- Some open doors lead to opportunities and blessings others open up to elevator shafts!!!
- <u>Satan loves to give you opportunities</u> and options to distract you from what God wants.
- <u>He'll flood the market so to speak in order to make God's opportunities harder to see.</u>

## 2. What constitutes a door opened by God?

- 1. <u>Open door is just that: an open door...you won't have to push it or</u> make it happen.
  - <u>I'm certain that we've all tried to force a door open</u>: It's something we want or want to do, so we manipulate ourselves or our situation to make it happen.
  - <u>Don't do that...you may just get what you're asking</u> for and find out that it was not what you wanted!!!
  - If a door isn't opening, figure that God is protecting you from something or that you're not ready yet for what's on the other side.
- 2. Let me show you an example of an open door in Scripture: I Cor. 16:8-9
  - Paul wrote I Corinthians from Ephesus
  - <u>The door of opportunity was wide open there</u> with literally thousands coming to faith in Christ.
  - <u>Ephesus was the key city of the province of Asia</u> and through his ministry there Paul was able to impact the whole province.
  - <u>Scripture says that the Gospel's influence was so powerful</u> in that region that it began to put those who made idols out of business because so many were coming to Christ.

## 3. An open door will have several defining characteristics:

- 1. <u>It will agree with your talents and abilities:</u> an opening for Paul to preach in teach freely in Ephesus certainly agreed with his talents and abilities.
- 2. <u>It will square with biblical values:</u>
  - <u>Will not make you compromise your relationship with God</u>...it's not an open door from God if it takes you away from Him, His service, or His church.
  - If it causes you in anyway to compromise your ethics or morals it is not from God.
- 3. <u>It will grow you spiritually...open doors will not undermine your spiritual growth.</u>
- 4. It will sit well with strong, stable Christians!
  - <u>One of the best things you can do to help guard yourself</u> from making mistakes is to find some Christians who are strong in there walk who you can bounce things off of.
  - <u>When they are not certain or feel funny about a potential open door</u> in your life, don't move or at least don't move quickly.
  - <u>God has given us the body of Christ to protect us</u> from things we may not be able to see.
- 5. <u>A door that God opens will often be opposed</u>. **I Cor. 16:8-9**. Would you have read it as a door of opportunity??
  - <u>Satan will often oppose an open door</u> especially if he knows your intent is to serve the Lord in whatever doors He opens for you.
  - Back to our text in Acts: Paul was opposed greatly in Thessalonica.
  - <u>The text says the main instigators were the Jews</u> but look who Paul blamed it on: **I Thess. 2:14-15, 18**.
  - <u>Paul knew who the real enemy was</u>...do you?
  - <u>Satan will try to deceive you</u>: the options are only 2 = right and wrong = chocolate and Vanilla, but he'll give you 31 flavors!!
  - <u>Satan will try to discourage you</u> he will throw difficulties and discouraging circumstances in your way to keep you fully entering the door the Lord has for you to go through.
- 6. <u>A door that God opens will be a door of conviction.</u>
  - <u>For Paul, Ephesus, Thessalonica, Philippi and any</u> other that God opened to him was a matter of conviction for him.
  - <u>He felt obligated to go and work and serve</u> in those places: **<u>Rom. 1:14</u>**.
